<u>Foundation:</u> This week we have been using the Makaton actions to help us talk about where all the animals were sleeping in Percy's hut. We are challenging ourselves to write longer words by breaking the words into parts and using our Fred fingers to pinch the sounds. In Maths we are exploring groups of objects by talking about more, fewer, and altogether. In Understanding of the world we have explored what it is like in the Arctic and talked about camouflage.

<u>Year 1:</u> In English this week, year 1 have been practising to write a class version of The Three Little Pigs, titled The Three Cheeky Blackbirds. We have used our story map and boxing up to help us to structure our writing. Next week, we will be inventing our own versions of the story.

<u>Year 2:</u> This week in science, we have been exploring microhabitats around the school grounds. They recorded their findings in a tally chart and then presented the data in a pictogram! Well done year $2 \ \bigcirc$

Year 3/4: This week in Year 3/4 we celebrated Burn's Night by enjoying some delicious haggis and by learning how to dance the Gay Gordon's which is a Scottish country dance. In Scotland and around the world, people celebrate the life and works of the Scottish poet, Robert Burns. Haggis is a traditional Scottish food which is served with tatties (mashed potato) and neeps (mashed swede). Most of the class really enjoyed it!

<u>Year 5:</u> This week in Maths, we have been learning how to multiply a 3-digit number by a 2-digit number, using long multiplication ad grid method. In English, We are working on our superheroes.

<u>Year 6:</u> this week, we have been converting between fractions, decimals, and percentages – we are pros at this now! In English, we have learned how to use a semi-colon; a piece of punctuation which joins two clauses which are closely related. As always, they have taken learning a difficult new concept, in their stride and been successful ©
