Dear parents/carers,

What a week it has been weather wise - I was expecting snow and ice and got rain instead! However, this has not dampened the children's spirits and they have been as excitable as always. It is fantastic to see their smiling faces in school

The children are now nearly halfway through their new History units; this is the next area of curriculum the teachers have been working hard to develop. Mrs Blake has been to see all of their learning in action and was blown away by the children's enthusiasm, inquisitive questioning and how well they remembered what they have learnt. I hope you have also seen and heard about this at home, if not, ask them to share their learning with you!

Year 4 finished their 3-week swimming block; they have thoroughly enjoyed their lessons. <u>Foundation</u>: This week we have been innovating our story by adding new characters. In Maths we have been exploring number bonds to 10 by playing games and learning a number bond rhyme. We have also learnt all about the changes Florence Nightingale made to hospitals and training nurses.
