

Transition days: As you all now know who your children's new teachers are in September, we will be arranging some opportunities for the children to spend some time in their new classes getting to know their new teachers, these will take place on the mornings of 10th & 14th July. If we find that some children need a bit more contact to feel confident, then we will arrange story times and extra visits for them. As I mentioned last week, we are lucky to be a small school where all children know most of the teachers.

Foundation: This week we have been sorting different objects into two distinct groups and counting objects above 20. We have also welcomed some of our new children to the class. Our current Foundation children were brilliant at showing the little ones the routines and making them feel very welcome. In literacy we have been thinking about rhyming words and making rhyming strings inspired by our class story Tiddler.



Year 1: This week we have had the balance scales out. We have been learning all about mass and how to measure it. We weighed items in the classroom to see how many cubes they weighed. We also tried to find things that had equal mass.



Year 2: This week year two have taken a visit to St Edwards Church to reinforce their learning in RE about what makes buildings and objects sacred.




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

Attendance.

Every moment in school counts, and days missed add up quickly. The higher a child's attendance, the more they are likely to learn, and the better they are likely to perform in exams and formal assessments. We are implementing new procedures to help parents get their children to school.

Do you know your child's attendance?

95% Attendance - 2 whole weeks of school missed.

90% Attendance - 4 whole weeks of school missed.

85% Attendance - 6 whole weeks of school missed.

80% Attendance - 8 whole weeks of school missed.

75% Attendance - 9 plus whole weeks of school missed.



5 minutes late, does it really matter?



Lateness = Lost Learning

(Figures below are calculated over a school year)

- 5 Minutes late each day 3 days lost
- 10 Minutes late each day 6.5 days lost
- 15 Minutes late each day 10 days lost

- 20 Minutes late each day 13 days lost
- 30 Minutes late each day 19 days lost

I want to start by thanking all of you who have contacted PPCV and sent in information to OFSTED about SEND services in Plymouth.

This morning I have been asked for 3 very specific types of information and I am hoping that you can help.

It is a short turn around and will need to be in by 9am on Thursday morning at the latest, as we are meeting with OFSTED at 11.30.

- 1) Information from families about why they decided to choose EHE as a result of an exclusion. Also if you are thinking about making that decision at the moment.
- 2) Are you currently on a waiting list or have been until recently for services such as but not exclusively CDC's diagnostic ASC pathway, Speech and Language or community paediatrics?

If so have you been offered any support or resources while you are waiting. An example of this could be guided self-help, advice and information or an emergency contact.

What contact did you have with the service before you were put on the waiting list?

3) Any examples of services that are working well for your family at the moment or anything positive that you have to say about a service.
